

From the Pastor's Desk

I have been spending a lot of time lately thinking about guilt, especially at the cultural level where it affects most of us at an unconscious level, affecting how we think about ourselves and God. I am finding two very big and different guilts crushing different people differently, and I believe the gospel speaks to both-- but in very different ways.



The first guilt comes to us in an interesting way. Most of our distant ancestors were ruled kings and queens, who we were told were put in place by God according to the church, which the rulers then confirmed. Through a series of revolutions in the west we overthrew all the monarchies and replaced them with nation states ruled by people following a set of agreed upon laws.

For this new nation state system to work we needed most people following all the laws and enough police to stop the non-law followers from messing too many things up. So we said, "Good people follow the law and bad people don't." To get people to take the law more seriously we said our laws were built on God's laws, which make them even better, so good Christians and good people follow the laws and non-Christian bad people don't.

What we didn't realize is that this would change the way people see God; for God to be as nothing but a judge wanting to punish us for acting badly and rewarding us for acting well, with our faith shifting to our moral actions. Guilt then became a tool to get people to behave a certain way and God became an idea to enforce the guilt.

The second guilt that has arisen is very different. It comes from a belief that at our core every one of us is magnificent and that living authentically to that in every part of our lives will enable us to become the best version of our self that we can be. Laws should only be guides to allow us to flourish, so long as we do no harm to others and allow them to flourish as well.

But to be authentic, we learned, requires feedback from others so we know we are being authentic and the best version of ourselves. As we moved toward a neoliberal version of our economy, we began turning all the aspects of our lives into a competition-- making even the feedback we need to be authentic a source of ongoing competition.

So the second guilt that we place on ourselves, as we struggle to live out so many choices while trying to show off our authenticity, is our failure to be the best version of ourselves that we can be. We ask things like, did I put enough effort into that relationship? Did I use my best ideas for that project at work? Was I a good enough friend for this person in my life? When we see other people around us being a better parent in this moment or that, we feel guilt for being so selfish and not putting forward our best effort in every moment.

What is amazing to me is that the gospel speaks to both guilts in two very different ways. The good news of Jesus' death and resurrection is that through our faith in Jesus our sins are forgiven, and that our moral actions do not save or damn us. Our faith sets us free to love freely for the sake of the other.

The good news also reminds us that God loves us, even before we try to be our authentic self. God doesn't ask us to show we are authentic, but rather asks us to be faithful to our God who loves us and to give ourselves in love to others through the authenticity that God made in us.


Christian Education Committee

Change to Church Security Effective May 1

Over the last several months, discussions have been held in regards to additional security for the Church. We are going to be contacting CEC (our current security company) for additional recommendations to increase our security.

We are going to take an initial step in limiting the number of exterior doors that will be unlocked for Church worship services and other church activities. The only doors that will be unlocked are the doors 1, 8, 9 on Scott Street and the door 2, the East Narthex entrance. Additionally for Thursday worship service in the Chapel, door 7 for the Chapel ramp will be unlocked.

From Our Parish Nurse

May is National Stroke Awareness Month

Every 40 seconds someone in the U.S. has a stroke. It is the number 5 cause of death and the leading cause of disability in the U.S. and up to 80% of strokes can be prevented.

A stroke occurs when blood to the brain is blocked by either a clot (called an ischemic stroke) or when a blood vessel ruptures (called a hemorrhagic stroke). Another type of stroke is a TIA, or mini stroke, which is caused by a temporary clot. Effects of a stroke depend on the region of the brain that blood cant reach and what particular body function that region controls.

Treatment is centered around removal of the clot or stopping the bleeding by either giving an IV medication to dissolve a clot or by surgical intervention to remove a clot or repair the vessel to stop the bleeding. In cases where stroke patients received the IV clot busting drug within 90 minutes of their first symptoms, they were 3 times more likely to recover with little or no disability. And in cases where a procedure is needed to remove the clot causing the stroke, 91% of stroke patients who were treated within 150 minutes of first symptoms recovered with little or no disability.

The faster a stroke is recognized and treated the more likely it is that the person is able to recover with little or no disability. Use the letters in F.A.S.T. to spot a stroke.

- F= Facial droop
- A= Arm Weakness
- S= Speech difficulty
- T= Time to call 911

Other stroke symptoms may include: numbness of the face, arm, or leg, especially on one side of the body, confusion, trouble seeing, trouble walking, or severe headache.

Some risk factors for stroke include: high blood pressure, smoking/vaping, diabetes, high cholesterol, physical inactivity and obesity, A fib or other heart/arterial disease, certain blood or clotting disorders, excessive alcohol use, illegal drug use, sleep apnea, and TIAs.
